North of Scotland Trauma Event

The North of Scotland Trauma event took place on 2nd October, with the Cabinet Secretary Ms Jeane Freeman and Lewis Macdonald MSP commending the work of the network 12 months on, following the launch of the network and MTC opening in 2018. Colleagues from Care of Burns in Scotland and the Child Brain Injury Trust ran workshops, and it was great to see the focus given to head injury rehabilitation.

The journey of a patient—from hearing a recording of the pre-hospital 999 call, to gaining an update from every stage of care from the clinicians involved, and video clips from the patient and his partner was particularly effective demonstrating the excellent work of the NHS.

The course has been developed for surgeons who manage neurotrauma and reconstruction and who have a strong interest in these fields. It has a focus on interdisciplinary care.



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SABIN Spotlight

Louisa Mackenzie, Outreach Charge Nurse, The Robert Fergusson Unit, Royal Edinburgh Hospital

I have been doing outreach work for the last eight years and it recently became a full time post. The main role of the outreach service is to support the discharge of patients from the Robert Fergusson Unit and to try to ensure a smooth transition back to the community. My role includes providing training and support to the new care team. I teach them how to provide the best possible support to the individual. Carers are encouraged to come to the Robert Fergusson Unit and shadow staff in order to learn all about the individual, about their likes and dislikes and how to safely carry out activities of daily living. I teach them about potential triggers for behavioural outbursts and strategies to manage the behaviour (i.e. what helps to calm them down and make them feel safe). Providing consistency is vital in the individual's ongoing care. I support the individual to spend increas-



ing amounts of time in their new setting in advance of discharge. I continue to provide follow



up after discharge over a number of weeks and sometimes months in order to support the new care team. The individual can be re referred to the outreach service if their behaviour deteriorates at some point in the future. We will work with the care team to problem solve and provide

As highlighted in the most recent Mental Welfare Commission report for our service, the other part of my role is to provide education and training to staff on Acquired Brain Injury, focusing on understanding and managing behavioural difficulties. Training can be provided to a range of services including care homes, community care teams, voluntary sector agencies etc. We can deliver the training anywhere in the community. What's Happening in our Working Groups?


Data Collection

We have spent time over the last period setting up regular meetings with the <u>Managed Service Network for Neurosurgery (MSN)</u>. Discussion is underway as to how this collaboration will increase our access to quality data, as well as any opportunities to share resources when providing educational events, and when producing documentation for clinicians. Children and Young People

The network will be adding more details of ABI services for children and young people to its website. This work is scheduled for 2020 and we'll let you know when it is complete.
